

The North Coast Division holds 10 meetings a year (none in July and August). Meetings are on the 2nd Friday of each month. A





LAYOUT POWER CONTROL - I think I have mentioned these handy devices before, but they warrant a second head's up as they are on sale. We use a lot of electricity to operate all the various devices on our layouts. Many of today's

electronic devices use "wall warts" for their power. Then there are all the tools we use during the construction phase. If you are installing electric outlets during the room preparation phase, it is a great idea to have switches near the entrance to turn the power on/off to the outlets. Common residential wiring practice in such cases is to split a duplex receptacle, with the top receptacle turned on and off by a switch and the power to the lower receptacle always on. However, as in my case, the receptacles were installed prior to the layout taken into consideration. These devices make for an easy and inexpensive option. They can purchased at Amazon, amongst other Search "Etekcity Wireless locations. Remote Control". Currently, the three pack pictured is available for \$16.98 (and free shipping if you are an Amazon Prime member). They also sell packs of five with a remote that can control up to five separate units. Multiple packs can be purchased and controlled by the same remote. I have five; #1 turns on my layout "day" lighting, #2 turns on my DCC Command Control unit, #3 turns on my three boosters and other electronics needed to run trains, #4 will eventually turn on my accessories and #5 controls my "night" lighting. The units are easily programmed for the number to control it. More than one can be set for the "channel". Very easy inexpensive solution. - Editor



Switzerland funicular: World's steepest railway opens

The world's steepest funicular railway has opened to the public in Switzerland.

Specially constructed cylindrical carriages have been used to ensure that passengers can stay upright on the incline.

The floors tilt, adjusting to the slope as the funicular climbs at a gradient of 110% at its steepest point.

The railway runs from the town of Schwyz up 110m (328ft) to the car-free Alpine village of Stoos.

The Stoos Bahn took 14 years to build - two years longer than scheduled - at a cost of 52m Swiss francs (£40m; \$53m).

But Ivan Steiner, spokesman for the railway, said the project's completion had

Frank was able to increase the points earned for members because of the length of the GLSC railroad show.

Anyone interested in the Association Volunteer award can contact Steve or myself for details.

This last article, PART 3, Association Volunteer will focus on the Statement of Qualifications forms used to apply for your award certificate.

These can be found on the NMRA website.

Look for the education tab along the top of the NMRA page. Click on that to see a drop down menu. Click on achievement program.

Here you can find all of the info needed for getting started in the Achievement Program.

Downloads of the forms you need are also located here.

I have added those forms to this article. The highlighted areas are what you need to fill out.

This completes the 3 part series on Achievement Program, Association Volunteer. I'd like to see many of the Division 4 volunteers that have earned many points already apply for this AP.

We are lucky to have many members in the Division that can help you earn any category in the AP!

You'll find a list of qualified witnesses below.

Joe is doing a great job of showing just how easy it is to get the Association Volunteer AP. "Leadership By Example" is a mantra I have always believed in. So, let's show all our members how easy this AP certificate is by doing it ourselves! - Editor

Requirements

Basic to each Achievement Program category are specific requirements pertinent to that category. The following requirements are pertinent to all categories. Each member who has been granted an Achievement Certificate must:

- Have completed all of the requirements for that category.
- Be a current NMRA member at the time of requesting certification.
- 3. Request certification on the official AP Statement Of Qualification form (SOQ) and submit two copies to the AP Manager of the Region (By way of the Divisional or Area Manager.) in which the menber currently resides.
 Note: Any member who resides outside their "Home" Region, for less than six months of the year, and who participates in the second region's contests, or has Merit Judging done there, but wants the certificate credited to the "Home" Region, can submit the SOQ to the second region's AP Manager with explanations.
- Submit a typed or legibly printed SOQ and the required supplementary attatchments.
 Note: Association Official, Association Volunteer, and MMR Categories specifically provide that the SOQs may be initiated by others.
- 5. Include on or with the SOQ all of the following:
 - Evidence of technical or service accomplishment.
 - Attachments of all supplementary material necessary to fully meet the stated requirements of the category.
 - Attachment of Merit Award Certification forms if required.
 - Certification by the Regional Manager.

Witnesses

For those categories which require that someone act as a witness or a judge to the accomplishments of the member requiring certification, a qualified witness shall be:

- 1. Past or present National or Region Officers;
- 2. Past or present National, Regional Contest or Achievement Program Manager or AP committee members;
- 3. Past or present AP National, Region or Division Manager or members holding the certificate;
- 4. NMRA members appointed by the Region or Division AP Manager as committee members, judges or witnesses

All witnesses must be current NMRA members and put their NMRA number on the witness form.

HELICON FOCUS

Photography has always been an interest in my life well behind model railroading, but still there. I purchased my first SLR camera when I went off to college. It was a decent model made by Canon. It required a lot of photography knowledge as it was all manual adjustments including focus, shutter speed and aperture. I used it for the typical family and vacation photos, and of course, trains large and small.

Towards the end of the last century (yes, I really did say that), I replaced my original camera with a Minolta Maxuum 7000. While still a film camera, it automated the camera focus and settings. Not surprisingly it markedly improved my photos.

After the turn of the century, through my employer, I obtained a decent digital camera, a point-and-shoot Canon G4. While I still owned my SLR, the handiness of having a digital camera caused me to seldom use the SLR. I particularly liked the digital camera due to its much smaller footprint. This allowed me to place the camera "into" the layout while taking model photos.

With the advent of smart phones and their included digital cameras, I again noticed my photo taking habits sliding towards the convenience factor. The smart phone was ALWAYS in my pocket whether visiting a friend's layout or seeing a prototype train or structure I wanted to capture. My digital photo collection grew and grew.

The personal photos I have used in *The Flatwheel* since taking over the editor's position have all been taken with a smart phone. Until recently, my phone was a 3 generation old Samsung S5. I replaced it with a Samsung Note 8 a few months ago. Both phones take very good photos. The Note 8 has, in addition to improved optics and software, OIS (**O**ptical **I**mage **S**tabilization). All combined, the Note 8 is allowing me to take in my honest opinion some amazing real life and model photos.

This long introduction brings me to the point of this article. From my first camera to my current smart phone camera, I have always had the issue of out-of-focus areas in the photo when taking the closeups required when photographing models. Look at this month's cover photo. The roof and birds are well focused, but the buildings in the background are hugely out of focus. This is very common of closeup photos.

There have been a number of work-around's over the years to improve on this issue. The model press had articles a half-century ago on making a pinhole lens for

your SLR. A manufacturer, Fricko, came out with such an adapter you could screw on the end of your standard lens. I still have a barely used one!

These work-around's, and more recent DSLR cameras with better lens and software, improve on the problem. But they all have issues that makes taking well focused closeups of our models difficult.

"Helicon Focus is a proprietary commercial digital image processing tool, first released in 2003, developed and published by Helicon Soft Limited, Germany. Helicon Focus is designed to blend the focused areas of several partially focused digital photographs to increase the depth of field (DOF) in an image. To increase it, Helicon Focus is capable of merging several differently focused images together to create one image where the subject is entirely in focus." - Wikipedia

While visiting Dave Lawler's ONTARIO SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY Ltd. railroad, I took several photos of different areas without the idea of testing Helicon

Focus.

I went home and with the idea to test Helicon Focus, I downloaded a 30-day free edition. They of course have tutorials and YouTube videos to teach you how to use their product. But I was testing its ease of use, so why "read the instructions?"

I dragged and dropped two photos onto the main work screen. Photos 1 & 2 below are cropped versions of the photos to help highlight the areas of focus. You can clearly see the truck at the front of Photo 1 is in focus and the tall building part way back is fuzzy. In photo 2, I focused on the building so the truck came out fuzzy. How many model photos have you taken like these where much of the photo is out of focus?

Helicon Focus has three rendering methods to choose from. Not having read the instructions, I opted for the default Method A. I then hit the green RENDER button. A few seconds later, I had the photo shown on the next page. Very simple, quick and, I think, impressive!!

PHOTO 2 - Building sharp, foreground unfocused



My quick study described here rendered only 2 photos. Helicon Focus can render a large number of images. If you look close at PHOTO 2, the layout's backdrop is not in focus and while the building is sharper, it is not truly in focus. The two photos were taken without the idea of stacking in Helicon Focus. They were simply "snapshots" I took during the open house.

If I were intending to make a really nice final photo of this example using Helicon Focus, I would have used maybe 6-8 shots with the focus spread from front to rear, making sure the key items were the point of focus in the various shots (front of the truck, back of the truck, crossing sign, outhouse, Hobby House, front wall of tall building, the 1st row of trees and finally the blue sky backdrop). With newer smart phones this is easily done by selecting the option to focus where your finger touches the screen.

The main thing to keep in mind as you take your series

of photos is to keep the camera in the EXACT same position while changing the point of focus.

So, I impressed myself and today, went on-line and purchased a one-year license.

There are three versions of Helicon Focus available, Lite, Pro and Premium. The Lite version will accomplish everything most of us need to generate some incredible model photos.

A one-year license for Helicon Focus Lite normally costs \$30. As of this writing, December 2, 2017, it is available for \$24.

If you are like myself and enjoy taking photos of trains small and large, I highly recommend you try Helicon Focus.

Use the free 30-day trial to see if you might make use of it going forward. Or just to make that one amazing photograph of your favorite modeling subject.

THE BYLINE...

Well, I needed to take a few months off from writing this Byline for our Editor, as other responsibilities were in the way. Still, in my spare time I was able to build a few kits.

Several years ago, I purchased a number of InterMountain tank car kits, many with Shippers Car Line Corp. reporting marks. These were popular in the 1940's on the Santa Fe. However, the kits looked difficult and I never bothered to build any of them. One day while going through kits that are still awaiting assembling, I saw these kits on the shelf and wondered how long one might take to build? When you open the box, the number of parts is a bit daunting.

I started by reading through the instructions and marking the areas where I had questions. Then rereading those areas of the instructions until I understood each process. The first kit took me about six hours and it made up into a nice tank car. The following four kits took about 4.5 hours each.

I found after building the first kit that it is best to assemble the kit in the following order: Build the tank body as one assembly. The underframe and running boards as one assembly and the same with the trucks.

Now attach the tank body to the underframe and running boards (this is Step 2. c. in the instructions). It will take some care to do this, but the safety placard brackets are already mounted on the running boards (much easier than putting them on when the tank is in place, how do I know that?).

The trucks with the kit are in four pieces. If you use some care in assembling them they look good and roll well if you use metal wheels sets. I put a spot of superglue where the bolsters attach to the side frames. Then I hit the trucks with some flat black and usually a mist of flat brown to accent the truck detail.

These cars came in 8,000 gallon and 10,000 gallon versions. The car in the middle is an 8,000 gallon car, sandwiched between two larger 10,000's.

That raps it up for this month. These cars do make nice additions to your freight car fleet, adding some dimensional verity.

Next month I'll discuss building Athrean 62' tank cars.

SOME INFO ON MODEL PAINTS

I have had a few discussions with members about model paints. I wanted to share info that might be of use.

TruColor Paints

Paints that are in the number series TCP-005 to TCP-799 are air brush ready paints. I have had very little luck doing that.

I found better results using Tru-Color thinner TCP-15-16.

Paints with the number series 800 to 899 are designed to be hand-brushed. I have gotten OK results using Tru-Color thinner for air brushing.

The thinner is acetone based but I still use Tru-Colors thinner. I do use acetone for clean up.

I contacted one of the people that formulated Tru-Color paint with questions and they are VERY helpful.

Tamiya Paints

Tamiya Paints are pretty good. I use Tamiya X-20A thinner with good results. I found that the number codes on X series paint bottles are NOT flat finish paints.

The XF series paints are flat finish paints. The "F" in Tamya paints XF series indicates a flat finish. There are many military colors in the Tamiya line that can be used for scenery and weathering projects. Check them out.



Vallejo

Vallejo is another brand of paints I use. Model Air series and Model Color series air brush pretty good. I use Vallejo thinners with this brand of paint.

Vallejo has a wide range of colors.

MicroLux Paints

Another really good line of paint is the MicroLux brand. I purchased this paint thru Micro-Mark.

There are two types of paints. Airbrush and brush on. I still found that these paints need to be thinned. I did get very good results using this brand. Micro-Mark sells several brands of

paints.



Other Options

Pat Catans craft stores have a large selection of all types of paints.

I use the DecoArt, Americana brand acrylic paint with good results.

Catans also stock many types of thinners and cleaners for every type of paints.

A few parting thoughts

One last tip. I still use BB's in my paint bottles to help mix the paint before using. A bottle of BBs can be purchased at sporting goods stores.

I learned that it is better to use small nuts from home supply stores. These will not fall into air brush jars as BBs can.

The small size nuts also do NOT block the openings of paint bottles such a Vallejo.

I also used BB's with good results for years in my Floquil paints. But when I switched to using all acrylic paints, I found out the hard way the BB's will eventually RUST, generating chunks in your paint. I have since switched to stainless steel hex nuts. I place at least three per jar. They work in all types of jars and do not rust or plug the hole in squeeze bottles. They can be purchased in quantity online or Ace Hardware if you only need a few. - EDITOR
