

NMRA MCR Division 4 January 2017 General Meeting Minutes

(Secretary's note: I got bumped on Clague Rd. and was 15 minutes late to the meeting. Thanks to Greg Noeth for taking the beginning Minutes.)

The meeting started at approximately 7:30 pm with a welcome to all by Superintendent Steve Kaplan.

Membership co-chair Bill Ferry announced new member lan Sly. There were no visitors.

Steve invited everyone to gather again after the clinic at Baker's Square on Lorain Rd in North Olmsted. Steve continued with a review of the Awards Banquet, thanking all who were involved in the planning, with additional thanks to George Keller for his "Elf on the Shelf" for the children.

Steve presented the following awards: Novak Award to John Hemsath, and Member Award to Ken Orchard.





Treasurer Greg Noeth reported that Division assets total \$51,837.52.

Clinic Chair Larry Madson said that the evening's clinic would be presented by Darl Swift on how he selects freight cars for his layout.

A report by the Module Group indicated that they had completed 75 shifts (300 hours) at the Lorain Trees & Trains Show. Their next event will be the Medina Train Show on February 5, 2017. 

BUYING A WATCH IN 1880

If you were in the market for a watch in 1880, would you know where to get one?

You would go to a store, right?

Well, of course you could do that, but if you wanted one that was cheaper and a bit better than most of the store watches, you went to the train station!

Sound a bit funny?

Well, for about 500 towns across the northern United States, that's where the best watches were found.

Why were the best watches found at the train station?

The railroad co. wasn't selling the watches, not at all. The telegraph operator was. Most of the time the telegraph operator was located in the railroad station because the telegraph lines followed the railroad tracks from town to town. It was usually the shortest distance and the right-of-ways had already been secured for the rail line.

Most of the station agents were also skilled telegraph operators and it was the primary way thev communicated with railroad. They would know when trains left the previous station and when they were due at their next station. And it was the telegraph operator who had the watches. As a matter of fact, they sold more of them than almost all the stores combined for a period of about 9 years.

This was all arranged by "Richard", who was a telegraph operator himself. He was on duty in the North Redwood, Minnesota train station one day when a load of watches arrived from the

It didn't take long for the word to spread and, before long, people other than travelers came to the train station to buy watches. Richard became so busy that he had to hire a professional watch maker to help him with the orders. That was Alvah. And the rest is history as they say.

The business took off and soon expanded to many other lines of dry goods. Richard and Alvah left the train station and moved their company to Chicago -- and it's still there.

YES, IT'S A LITTLE KNOWN FACT that for a while in the 1880's, the biggest watch retailer in the country was at the train station.

It all started with a telegraph operator: Richard SEARS and his partner Alvah ROEBUCK!



At the counter is a bin with discounted products. I was able to purchase a set of 1-2-3 metal blocks at half the cost of the same item in catalogs! 1-2-3 blocks are small metal blocks very useful to hold items while gluing or to place on models to hold in position for gluing.

I found GFS stores to be a great place to get small plasti containers with lids (for parts, paint mixes, dry weathering pigments and a whole lot of useful places on the workbench).

Aluminum foil containers (I use them for scenery, painting work), plastic table covers (cheap drop cloths) and a nice long chef's apron (put the apron on, attach to front to your work area with Velcro) to catch small parts falling before they get lost on the floor! I am told jewelers use something similar



THE BYLINE...

Hello, this being my first article in a long time for the Flatwheel, let me offer some mention of introduction. I first joined Division 4 in 1977 and was active until 1985. In "85" I was a senior in college and engaged to my wife, leaving me little time for modeling. The Late Richard (Dick) Smerke brought me back into the fold in 1990. Last January I attended a Division 4 meeting and purchased a Fairport Painesville & Eastern Accurail boxcar. Actually I purchased two and this is where the Byline starts.



There were two road numbers available and the sample car was built and the only one left with the second number. Chuck agreed to sell me the sample car. I decided that I should build the other car and return it to him at the February meeting in exchange for the remaining kit. However, I was very busy at work and didn't think I had time to spare building car kits.

Well there is an old saying: If you want something done give it to a busy person!

So I set short time goals for myself, learning what could be done in 15, 30 and 60 minutes intervals. With Accurail kits you can cut all the frame & brake casting off the sprues (for two kits), clean the flash off and glue them to the floor in 30 minutes. Then wipe the metal weight down with rubbing alcohol and glue it in place with Aleene's "Tacky Glue". In 15 minutes, you can paint the weight and exposed floor flat black with a rattle-can of Krylon paint; and start prepping the car body. The next 15 minute session you can turn the frames over and paint the underside of the frame, trucks and coupler covers, all in place, with a can of Krylon Camouflage Brown paint (marked non-reflective); and finish up the car body including painting the brake shaft (on wood boxcars). When there were 3 or 4 frames and car bodies ready, they go

together in 15 to 20 minutes. When finished the coupler height and car weight was checked.



Last year between January 15 and the end of May, 85 car kits, from Athearn, Bowser and Accurail were assembled using this process. That's an average of 4.7 kits a week. And one of the kits was an Accurail tri-level auto rack. It's a great way to get car kits off the shelf.

Below are a few hints:

Insert the plastic wheel sets in the trucks when painting them; this keeps the paint from going into the bearing opening.

By painting the floors and trucks the finished model is enhanced.



Screws were used to hold coupler pockets and trucks on all of the cars. This also required drilling and tapping on some kits, less than a 15 minute process per car.

Have fun! And if our Editor likes this article, I'll be back in March? Bridges!

Fate of 120-car-strong Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey circus train fleet undetermined

ELLENTON, Fla. — When the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey circus drops its big top for the last time in May, the classic passenger cars and equipment it moves by rail will return to Florida to face an uncertain future.

In a late Saturday news release, managers with Ringling parent company Feld Entertainment say high operating costs and declining ticket sales are forcing them to stop both "Red" and "Blue" tours of the circus in May. The company's Red unit will make its final performance in Providence, R.I., on May 7 and the Blue unit will finish up in Uniondale, N.Y., on May 21.

Stephen Payne, vice president of corporate communications at Feld Entertainment, tells Trains News Wire that both the Red and Blue trainsets will be deadheaded to Florida at the end of their tours. Payne says a final disposition for the trains and associated equipment has yet to be determined.

The Red unit consists of 54 cars: 34 coaches and 20 flat cars. The Blue unit includes 35 coaches and 21 equipment flat cars. Each unit travels independently across North America.

In addition, the company has five equipment flat cars and three passenger coaches in storage, while six stock cars previously used to haul elephants and other animals are also in storage near the company's headquarters in Palmetto, Fla.

The company owns and operates more than 120 railcars and is among the largest passenger car operators in North America. The cars operate under "RBBX" reporting marks.

Between 250 and 300 performers and other circus workers travel on each of the two circus trains for more than 40 weeks each year.

Both trains recently started their 2017 tours. The Red unit is in Orlando, Fla., and will be traveling to Jacksonville, Fla., for shows the week of Jan. 16, while the Blue unit will be leaving Miami on Sunday, Jan. 16 headed for Birmingham, Ala.

The Red unit will use CSX Transportation rails to get to Jacksonville, while the Blue unit will travel Florida East Coast rails once departing Miami.

The decision to eliminate both circus trains comes in the wake of the circus' 2016 announcement to stop using elephants in shows. The elephant stock cars have been in storage in Florida since being removed from the train last summer.

The circus, which owners have billed the "Greatest Show on Earth," has roots in Delevan, Wis., that date to 1875 with a traveling circus headlined by P.T. Barnum; and a separate circus started by Baraboo, Wis.'s Ringling Brothers in 1884. The Ringlings bought Barnum & Bailey in 1907 and officially merged the operations in 1919. The Circus World Museum in Baraboo, Wis., displays circus and railroad artifacts from the early years of circus entertainment.

On Sunday, Circus World Museum Executive Director Scott O'Donnell fielded a continuous steam of media queries. In an interview, he said the museum would welcome rolling stock from the current circus trains.

"This comes as an absolute surprise," he said about the decision to end the show. "It's not only the end of an American institution, it's also the end of an American brand that's been around longer than baseball, and around longer than Coca-Cola. They're all iconic American imagery."







