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



With exception of editing your newsletter and attending our monthly meetings, I have been without motivation to actively work on my hobby for some time now. It is easy for me to diagnose the issue as it has happened several times in my nearly 60 years in the model railroad hobby. TRACK! I HATE installing track!! I know, how can you be a model railroader and hate installing track?

I have compounded the issue with my current layout plan. I have decided to go back to my roots and again build a protofreelanced version of the East Broad Top narrow gauge railroad. As I love operations, I must include the rather extensive Mt. Union interchange between the EBT and its standard gauge neighbor, the Pennsylvania Railroad. This of course means a significant amount of dual gauge track. Yikes!!

While Shinohara makes very nice #6 dual gauge turnouts, they are rather long for the space I have. This means I need to custom build my dual gauge turnouts. Fast Tracks makes a dual gauge system but again it is for #6 turnouts. In my desperation, I contacted the owner of Fast Tracks and offered to pay up front and in full the cost of a set of jigs if he could make a set of #5. Sadly he stated the intricacies of a jig that small is just not doable. Hence my source of procrastination and

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stagnation is now known throughout the Division.

I recently saw an advertisement for the long out of production Walthers Operating Single-Track Railroad Bascule Bridge. My good friend and your Trustee Quad



County Jim Moore's Cold Creek and Lake Erie Railroad is a representation of the Penn Central, circa 1968, between Cleveland and Toledo. If you are familiar with this area you will know the double track main spans the Portage River in Port Clinton on such a bridge. While I was perusing the aisles of the recent Trainfest show, I spotted one of the new kits and quickly scooped it up.

I am one week into the project of transforming this into a model representing the circa 1915 Portage River bridge. A rough count would place my time on the project to date at 30 hours and I have not quite finished the lift section! I do need to point out the kit is a single track unit and the Portage River bridge is a double track main feeding a four track lift section. The lift section's center two tracks are supported by a truss structure similar to the kit but with a single track plate girder bridge hanging off each side. While the railroad never used the outer two bridge sections they are still there and make for a very unique structure. I wanted to capture its uniqueness in the operating model.

Thanks also to my good friend George Keller for the donation of numerous bridge pieces and cast gussets. I could not have do it without them.

This has not been an easy project but it has definitely resuscitated my gasping hobby interest. The point of this editorial is to say if you find yourself stuck such as I have, all is not lost. One of the things that makes model railroading such a great hobby is the number of different facets available for us to enjoy.

GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

APRIL 14, 2017

Division 4 General Meeting Minutes for April 14, 2017

Superintendent Steve Kaplan started the meeting at 7:30 pm.

Membership co-chair Bill Ferry stated that there are no new members to introduce this month. There were also no visitors at the meeting, apart from some Medina 4H members who deferred recognition until later in the meeting.

Steve invited everyone to proceed to Baker's Square after the evening's clinic for food and additional informal discussions.

Steve reported that he did not win the Central District Director's position but that it was a close race (627 to 601). It was the largest response to an election for this position.

The revised Division Rules (formerly called Bylaws) have been placed on the Division website (www.div4.org) for membership review. Steve asked for a motion and second to dispense with the reading of the Rules, which he received. A vote carried unanimously. A decision on the second required reading will take place at next month's meeting.

Treasurer Greg Noeth reported \$50,381.72 in assets. No payments have been made toward the October Train Show due to a new system at the Berea Fairgrounds; Greg expects to make a payment next month.

Larry Madson, Clinic chair, said that Lee Sheffield would be giving the evening clinic on tuning of cars (i.e., coupler, wheel and weight adjustments). Next month's clinic will be by Bruce Brintnall MMR and Steve on Imagineering (improving your layout by imagining yourself as a scale sized person). For the June clinic, Larry asked for a show of hands for a clinic on moving from DC to DCC or a clinic on tree making – and tree making (clinician George Keller) won.

Scott Benson, Modular chair, reported that the group would be at the Ritter Library in Vermillion next weekend and invited everyone to visit and/or participate.

Contest chair Dave Lawler said that tonight's contest is for "painted over" numbers and lettering on cars indicating change of ownership, etc. Dave stated that henceforth each contest would contain two subcategories: diorama and model (by itself). Members will vote for each subcategory. The rule will remain one entry per member (either subcategory but not both). Winners of last month's contest were announced, with winners describing their models and techniques.

Steve reminded members that they can register for the Mid Central Region's upcoming convention, and for Division 2's (Pittsburgh area - *Editor*) one day Jamboree.

Ron Morgan, Layout chair, spoke of the upcoming tours. He said that there was an error on a date in the original tour publication but it has been corrected in the latest schedule. The Cuyahoga Valley & West Shore club will be open on one of the days (refer to your email for details).

The Medina County Model Railroad 4H Club came forward as a group. Their spokesman presented the Division with a Thank You card signed by all their members as well as several Medina County Fair passes (the group displays their modules in a combined layout each year at the Fair). Steve talked about the high quality of the 4H displays and encouraged everyone to visit the Fair.



Chuck Klein, Company Store, began his report with an Easter Bunny duet with his brother to membership applause, then moved on to list his current inventory.

Mike Klein, Raffle, said that the evening's theme is iron ore. Mike reminded everyone that sending articles to the Flatwheel will result in redeemable coupons for the raffle.

Bill Cramer said the B&O Society would be hosting a mini convention the same weekend as the Regional convention, asking for those who would not be attending the Regional to please consider this event.

Steve ended the meeting by requesting everyone going into the hallway to be respectfully of the Good Friday service at the other end of the building.

The meeting concluded at 7:56 pm. 🗸

The bad news is the material is not holding up to the weight my body is placing on it. So....I still recommend its use, but only for those weighing somewhere under 200 lbs. OR, as I am about to try, place a piece of 1/8" masonite under it to provide the strength it lacks to hold up to the point loads caused by your body weight through the wheels. - Editor



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I want to add my thoughts to those made by Lee Sheffield in the March *Flatwheel* on the pilgrimage to West Springfield Mass by seven members of the Division 4 module group for the Amherst Railway Society Show.



This was my first trip to the Amherst Show. All I can say is WOW! So much to see. My goal was to speak to the manufacturers in hopes to strike up some relationships for TRAINing Day and The Great Berea Train Show. I was able to have some great conversations with Bowser, Intermountain, Kadee, Walthers, Athearn, and of course Scale Trains!

THE BYLINE...

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This month I want to discuss a favorite topic of mine, helping a friend with his or her layout. I had not ever considered asking someone else to help me with my layout (an exception was my wife). A friend was preparing a layout space in an outbuilding on the side of his house. He mentioned that he planned to have work sessions once the room was complete and he started building bench work. The idea intrigued me and I asked if I might be included in the sessions.

Initially while building bench work he kept the group small, just three or four guys; but once the bench work was finished he invited a few more people to the work sessions. I'll discuss how the sessions worked, what I learned by participating, problem resolution and why this type of participation is important!

Work Session:

In this example the work sessions were always on Friday nights. The group would assemble between 7:00 & 7:30 PM. At around 7:30, always by 7:40 we went into the layout room to start working. The host would give us a short review of the prior week and then the agenda for that evening. He had prepared all of the necessary items we needed to accomplish our tasks. All nails, screws, drill bits, lumber, wire, solder etc...were all at hand. We were generally divided into groups of two, given a task and went to work. In one evening I and a friend did 50 wire drops in 2 hours. We drilled the hole, soldered the wire to the rail, attached the lead to the bus-wire and tested the connection. I sat under the layout whereas my partner worked above. There were generally three groups of two people working in three different areas doing different things. I haven't the words to illustrate the change that took place on the owner's layout every Friday night. Over one month the change was enormous!

Learning from the experience:

First I learned "Don't build what you cannot maintain!" I helped build scenery using spray foam in a can, painted parts of the sky with a brush, track laying using caulk, installing fascia, wiring, how to use spine sub-roadbed and many little ideas I would have never thought of on my own. In those 30 minutes or so before we started working, often the conversations centered on helping solve some question the layout owner or one of us had regarding their layout. The sessions always ended around 10 o'clock and we were on the road by 10:15 most evenings. So I also learned the sessions had to be short, focused and start and end on time.


Problem Resolution:

So what happened if we didn't do the task to the owner's expectations? Well the owner said nothing. The following week when we returned, that area was usually fixed. No one ever was told they did a bad job. Sometimes someone would ask how the area/item was fixed. In those cases the owner would explain that he found a way to improve, learn a better way etc... and we all moved on. He did a great job with problem resolution and I never knew anyone who had their feeling hurt.

Conclusion:

For me what I learned from the experience was how to stage working on larger projects. You have to plan the steps. Writing them down is a good idea. The details are important e.g. if there is a bridge, how long, how high, how many tracks and always ask can I maintain this (whatever this is?). Stick to the plan; but if you run into a problem with the plan, STOP at the first sign of an issue. Go back to





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what you wrote down and start making notes on what you need to change. Can you live with the new changes? If you can, proceed; if you can't, figure out what has to be fixed and fix it. If you continue to go on and figure you will come back and fix the problem later, you're in trouble. This is the voice of "Experience".

The friendships that grew from this experience continue to this day. There are now a dozen people or so I can now call on for help. And knowing that I have a group who can help me problem solve, with much wider knowledge than just mine, is reassuring.

Helping someone with their layout is a *GREAT* way to participate in our hobby! I know this because I operated on one of the layouts I helped with this morning.

I hope this inspires you to build something, or even better, help a friend on his layout, before my next article.



Daniels Hobbies is about a block away on the right side of East Main Street. Parking is easy to find. You'll find Norwalk, Ohio a great place to visit.




Located to the left as you walk are kits, scenery items, track supplies and train sets. The people at Daniels Hobbies are super friendly!

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
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
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
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The North Coast Division
