



**HERE's AN IDEA** - I use compressed air cans for years to blow dust off slides when scanning and general computer work. I now use them all around the layout and workbench. They can be purchased at any office supply store.

I found using the air cans very helpful in drying air brush parts and bottles when cleaning. Like when a dentist blows air on a tooth before filling, drying the tooth for a better bond.

The air cans also can be used to help dry glues, paints (be careful) and clean up of



model parts before assembly.

They are great to clean up switch points and frogs. I found the straws at Marcs located around the Cleveland area. Cost for a package is 80¢.



While getting ready to paint a caboose, I realized that I installed couplers. Instead of removing the couplers I used a jumbo straw to cover the coupler when air brushing.

These large straws can be used for pipe, pipe loads, culverts and chimneys. - *Joe Kurilec, MMR*

## FROM A \$1.00 AT THE DOOR TO MONEY IN THE BANK - A DIVISION SUCCESS STORY.

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# The following article by Ron Morgan highlights the critical role THE GREAT BEREA TRAIN SHOW plays in the quality of our Division. PLEASE sign up to help next month! - *EDITOR*

The other day I was thinking about my time as a member of the Division and all the changes that have occurred.

One that came to mind right away is how the Division has gone from paying a \$1.00 per person at the door at each Division meeting in order to pay for the printing and distribution of the *Flatwheel* to a bank account, that if properly maintained, will provide the Division funds for some time to come.

It all started with a simple plan by Terry Stewart to have a train show that would help raise funds to pay for the printing and distribution of the *Flatwheel*. The first show was held at the Harley House on Bagley Road in Middleburg Heights. I remember Terry asking for members help at the show so I showed up an hour or so before the show opened. I found Terry putting table cloths on the tables. I pitched in and when that was done I was asked if I would take money at the door (a very organized event). I figured first time him – first time me, why not.

As the public arrived I collected, collected, collected and collected. Eventually additional help arrived, George Noaks. (George and I became instant friends that lasted until his passing). Finally after several hours, Terry appeared and I asked what he wanted me to do with all this money? Give it to the treasurer. 
The clinics were among the best in recent years. Towards the end of the week, vendors such as Walthers and Digitrax gave clinics to discuss their products. The clinic schedule was well arranged, giving ample time for lunch and dinner.

The big news during the week was upcoming discounts for NMRA members through various

retailers, including Micro-Mark. Special Interest groups had their own room. Operations SIG offered a new book aimed at neophyte operators. (Some advice from the book: When operating on someone else's layout, wear short sleeves to help avoid damaging things).



A number of layout tours were given and apparently the area has quite a few exceptional layouts (and very few in basements!). While some of the scheduled prototype tours were cancelled shortly before the convention, a fair number managed to survive. The general interest tour to the Space Center received a last minute upgrade to VIP tour thanks to former employee Leslie Eaton MMR. ### A message from Charlie Getz, NMRA President -

Gallery Exhibit and Kalmbach Memorial Library move at the California State Railroad Museum status

It has been a long process but we are happy to announce that the long-promised Gallery Exhibit ("Exhibit") and Kalmbach Memorial Library ("Library") move at the California State Railroad museum are finally underway.

The Exhibit was first proposed over a decade ago. Benchmark Publications' publisher and MMR Bob Brown once said: "To attract people to our hobby, you must show them what we do." We know from the success of train shows and the World's Greatest Hobby campaign, such public exhibits work well and inform and excite the public about our hobby.

Over the past six years, we raised \$250,000 from our members and corporate partners as we have promised that this Exhibit will not use dues money. The estimate for the project's fabrication and installation is between \$500,000 and \$750,000. We will fund that amount by donation.

Implementation delays were due to a problem that involved CSRM's parent agency, the California Department of Parks and Recreation. After much patience and entreaties, CSRM management worked out all of the obstacles preventing final approval and in late June, we finally received the long-promised agreement authorizing the Exhibit. The BOD unanimously approved that agreement in an electronic vote in June to meet a BOD-imposed July 15 deadline for finalizing the agreement.

The agreement could not be more fair nor inclusive. We are happy to report all of the elements described or represented over the years are included. There is no cost to NMRA for the space provided and utilities/outside maintenance will be performed by CSRM. We will be responsible for interior maintenance, which we prefer. We will own the exhibit which can be moved and used later in a permanent Museum. Although they no longer do so, CSRM has agreed to administer our Library and allow full access to their vastly larger library to NMRA members at no additional cost.

Amtrak 'Capitol Limited' schedule modified after Sand Patch grade derailment

A CSX Transportation freight train derailed at least 32 cars near Hyndman, Pa. on Wednesday morning impacting both freight and passenger railroads.

HYNDMAN, Pa. — Amtrak's *Capitol Limited* between Washington and Chicago will be running on a modified schedule for the next four days after a CSX Transportation freight train derailed more than 30 cars east of Sand Patch near Hyndman, Pa., on Wednesday morning.

Amtrak spokeswoman Kimberly Woods tells Trains

News Wire eastbound train No. 30 will terminate in Pittsburgh for the next four days, while its counterpart, westbound train No. 29, will have it passengers bused from Washington to Pittsburgh to meet up with the train consist. Passengers trying to get to Washington from points west will be bused from No. 30's terminating point in Pittsburgh.

On Wednesday morning at around 5 a.m., at least 32 cars of a 178-car eastbound CSX freight train derailed and caught fire near Hyndman on the railroad's Keystone Subdivision. The incident is affecting both freight and passenger operations on the railroad's famed Sand Patch grade route.

Fires were still burning and evacuations were still in place for a half-mile radius as of Wednesday evening.

The cause of the derailment remains under investigation. No injuries were reported.


This would be about 60+ miles one way. The trail looks like a future adventure.

I recently had the pleasure of riding on the Hocking Valley Scenic Railway. This small scenic railway is nestled in Neslonville, Ohio of the southeastern part of the state. The train operates twice a day on Saturday



and Sunday from May through October. There are also some special trains that railway operates such a Robbery Train, an All Caboose Train, and Fall Foliage Trains. The Fall Foliage Trains begin running on Thursday and Friday during the month of October. More information regarding the trains ride offered by the Hocking Valley Scenic Railway can be found at www.HockingValleyTrain.org. The standard price per ticket is \$17 each (not including "convenience" fees charged for phone orders or online orders.)



### News Release August 1st, 2017

### Bring Back 757

The Mad River & NKP Railroad Museum (MR&NKP) is pleased to announce the creation of an agreement with the Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania (RRMPA) that would allow Nickel Plate Road Steam Locomotive #757 to return to Bellevue, Ohio. Plans are now underway to relocate the locomotive from Strasburg, PA, to the museum site in Bellevue for static display.

"We are very excited to be able to bring the 757 back to Bellevue. The absence of a mainline steam locomotive in our collection has been something we have wanted to correct for a long time. To have the chance to return the 757 to Bellevue is an incredible victory for our organization," said museum President Chris Beamer.

The locomotive is a Berkshire type (2-8-4 wheel arrangement), the staple design that was made famous by the Nickel Plate Road (NKP). It was built by the Lima Locomotive Works in 1944 and was last operated on June 15, 1958. As steam locomotives were retired on the Nickel Plate, several were saved by the railroad as monuments to the towns along the line and donated accordingly. 757 was saved for Bellevue, Ohio, Nickel Plate's largest classification terminal. Unfortunately, at that time, Bellevue did not have a railroad museum and the city was unable to provide and fund a display site. After being stored at Bellevue for several years, the railroad donated the locomotive to the Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania in 1966.

Ten years after Bellevue lost its steam locomotive, the Mad River & NKP Railroad Museum was founded. Since then, the MR&NKP has grown to encompass 50 pieces of equipment, 10 acres of property, five buildings, countless artifacts, and a rail viewing platform. The MR&NKP is a non-profit 501(c) 3 organization that is operated and maintained by volunteers with no government assistance. Admission to the museum, fund raising events, and donations are the museum's primary sources of income. The MR&NKP has the most extensive collection of NKP equipment and artifacts of any museum, however owning an actual NKP steam locomotive has eluded the museum since its inception.

In early 2017, the MR&NKP and the RRMPA entered into negotiations to bring 757 back home. Within the past few months, the RRMPA and the Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission has agreed that 757 does not have as strong a connection to Pennsylvania's railroading history as some of their other locomotives and railroad cars, which also require considerable attention. They have made the difficult decision to deaccession 757 from their collection, with the intention of transferring the locomotive to an organization that has a better connection to the locomotive's history and is willing and able to immediately restore it.

The MR&NKP will begin movement preparations as funds permit and will be granted ownership of the locomotive after its removal from the RRMPA site. "The people of the Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania have been great to work with on this project and toward the common goal of preserving our country's railroad heritage," Beamer added.

This is a rare opportunity and may not be available again. The MR&NKP estimates the relocation, restoration, and preparation of a special exhibit site will cost \$250,000. The Mad River & NKP Railroad Museum needs your help to bring this iconic locomotive back home to Bellevue. Please visit www.bringback757.org for more information and/or to donate.

# REAL RUST!

Several years ago I noticed that the steel stiffener bar on the bottom of our snow shovel was leaving unsightly orange rust stains an the floor of our garage. (photo 1)

So, in order to not incur the wrath of Mrs.





Cheerios, l found an old plastic planter

box tray to keep the shovel off the floor. (photo 2)



At the end of winter, while putting the shovel away, I noticed that there was an accumulation of rust in the bottom of the tray. (photo 3)





soon I had a nice accumulation of orange rusty water. (photos 4 & 5)

I poured this mix through a strainer to remove any dead mice or other debris, into my trusty Rubbermaid pitcher then into a jar to let the rust settle out leaving the water on the surface. (photos 6, 7 & 8)



The water is then carefully removed with an old towel or an eye dropper leaving only the "rust concentrate" in the bottom of the jar. (photo 9)

To this I add



Remember to stir or shake the rust mix frequently while applying to keep it in suspension in the alcohol. It will settle out rather quickly.

Once dry on the model, I like to give it a light brushing with a stiff paint brush to tone it down and blend it in.








